A late fee of \$25 per class will be required for those registering after the June 30 formal registration

deadline. Late registration is available at Redmond High School, in the Library, 17272 NE 104th, Redmond, WA, 98052, from 9:30 AM – 1:30 PM.

Fees:

The basic four week course fee for residents of the LWSD is \$350.00 for a .5 credit high school course and \$200.00 for a junior high course. Non-district residents pay an additional \$10 for each class taken, \$360.00 for a .5 credit high school course and \$210.00 for a junior high course. Lab fees are included in the course fee, unless otherwise noted.

Reduced Fees

The Lake Washington School District Board of Directors has determined that LWSD students who qualify for free or reduced lunch at their home school during the school year, also qualify for reduced Summer School tuition, for Core classes only, subject to the following guidelines:

- 1) Free or reduced lunch status must be verified by the home school official on the registration form, prior to Summer School.
- 2) Free or reduced lunch forms WILL NOT be available during Summer School registration. Please obtain home school official's signature before regular school is dismissed for the summer as summer school staff cannot verify Free or Reduced lunch status.
- 3) Free lunch status for district residents:
 - High School Course Fee = \$105.00
 - Junior High School Course Fee = \$60.00
- 4) Reduced lunch status for district residents:
 - High School Course Fee = \$175.00
 - Junior High School Course Fee = \$100.00

Reduced fees are only applicable to core classes. Reduced fees can be applied only as follows:

- 9-11th Graders: Math, Language Arts, Social Studies and Science courses only
- 12th Graders: Any course needed to graduate
- 7th & 8th Graders: Reading, Language Arts and Math

Fee Refunds

The course fee will be refunded if a course is cancelled. Refunds for ongoing courses will be approved on or before July 2, 2009. Please Note: **NO refunds will be approved once Summer School classes have begun after July 6, 2009.**

Course Cancellations

Summer school is a self-supporting program dependent on student fees. Courses which fail to achieve minimum student enrollment will be cancelled. Parents will be notified of cancellations and fees will be refunded as soon as possible, usually in 4-6 weeks. Your student is considered registered in the class(es) for which you apply; no official confirmation is sent. You WILL be notified if a class is cancelled.

Attendance Policy - Credit Classes

Students are expected to be in class on the first day of school. All class sessions must be attended. A maximum of two absences is allowed if the student is to earn credit in any class. Four tardies constitute one absence. Missing more than 30 minutes of any class period is defined as an absence for credit purposes. Work missed as a result of an excused absence must be made up, if the student is to earn credit. **Refunds will not be granted to students who fail to meet the attendance requirement, or who are withdrawn for disciplinary reasons.**

Fines

Unpaid fines for lost books, broken/lost materials will be sent to your student's home school. You will have to pay these fines before receiving your student's Summer School report card or high school diploma.

Special Services

Program support and accommodations are NOT available during Summer School for students in Special Services programs, that is, students with an IEP (Individualized Education Plan) or 504 Plan (diagnosed health impairment accommodation that needs to be made to assure the student equal access to the general education curriculum). If you have questions, please contact your home school counselor or teacher.

Medical Information

Please list on the registration form any medical information for your child in the event of an emergency. This might include medications which the student may need to take during the school day, for example, medication for allergies, migraines, etc.

A medical authorization form MUST be completed by a doctor before **any medications** can be given during the school day. Medical authorization forms are available at your home school and must be turned in to the Summer School office with your registration form. Medication to be given during school hours by a trained staff member, must be to the summer school office (library) by the first day of summer school.

Senior High Credit Courses (Grades 9 - 12)

July 6 – July 31, 2009

\$350.00 Resident, \$360.00 Non Resident

Level 4 English Workshop SUM104

(Grades 9-10) - Session 1: 7:30 AM – 10:40 AM / Session 2: 11:20 AM – 2:30 PM

This course is for ninth and tenth graders interested in gaining more practice with fundamental reading, writing and speaking skills. In this class students will learn and practice strategies before, during and after reading (to ensure better comprehension) therefore be better equipped to analyze, synthesize and evaluate information from reading. Students will also have opportunities to work on developing their skills as writers. Expository writing will be the emphasis with one opportunity for some creative short story writing as well. Students will learn how to craft thesis statements, develop their examples and evidence in their body paragraphs, use transitions effectively and write strong conclusions. Teachers will use a variety of resources such as Step Up to Writing and 6+1 Traits of Writing. Finally, students will also have some experiences with speaking in front of the class. Students and teachers will explore the necessary components of an effective presentation. All students should come ready and willing to learn and participate.

Level 5 English Workshop SUM105

(Grades 11-12) - Session 1: 7:30 AM – 10:40 AM / Session 2: 11:20 AM – 2:30 PM

This course is for eleventh and twelfth graders interested in getting a jump start or catching up on developing their communication portfolios. Graduating seniors are expected to compile examples of their proficiency in persuasive, compare/contrast and literary analysis essays. Students will have the opportunity to work on these essays. Students are also given the opportunity to develop their critical reading skills, to present information within a four-to-five minute time frame. Students assess themselves and will be assessed using the district rubrics for their writing pieces and speech(es). This is a great opportunity for students to get at least one of the graduation requirements completed.

Culminating Project Completion/High School & Beyond Plan Completion SUM150

(No Credit)

(Seniors only) - 7:30 AM – 10:40 AM

During this course seniors will be guided through the completion of their Culminating Project. Students will complete a Presentation Portfolio, to be turned in on the Presentation date. Part of the work that students complete in this course will be the Research/I-Search paper assessed with the appropriate rubric. The student will be assessed on the quality of the project and presentation skills using the LWSD rubric for Culmination Projects. Students will also be able to work on and complete the elements outlined in the High School & Beyond Plan requirements for high school graduation. Prerequisite: Previous completion of project Plan and the commitment of a field advisor.

Algebra I – Second Semester Credit SUM220 (Grades 9-12) – 11:20 AM – 2:30 PM

Algebra provides a practical blend of technology-related and paper-and-pencil problem-solving tools. Explorations and investigations emphasize symbol sense, algebraic manipulation and conceptual understandings. Students make sense of important algebraic concepts, learn essential algebraic skills and discover how to use algebra. This course allows students to experience numerical, graphic, symbolic and verbal expressions of math problems. Topics in this course include: Graphing, Linear Equations, Quadratic Equations, Functions, Exponents, Data Analysis, Proportional Reasoning, Probability and Systems of Equations and Inequalities.

Geometry – Second Semester Credit SUM250

(Grades 9-12) - 11:20 AM – 2:30 PM

Discovering Geometry provides an opportunity for students to explore geometric relationships with a wide variety of tools, including compasses, computers and graphing calculators. Students perform constructions, measure figures, observe patterns, discuss their findings, write their own definitions, and formulate and prove geometric conjectures. Topics include properties of triangles, polygons, and circles, transformations and tessellations, area and volume, the Pythagorean Theorem, congruence and similarity.

Advanced Algebra (Algebra II) SUM222 – Second Semester Credit

(Grades 9-12) - 7:30 AM – 10:40 AM

Topics included: elementary trigonometry, algebraic functions, quadratic equations and systems, polynomial functions, sequences and series and circular functions.

Biology – First or Second Semester Credit SUM320**(Grades 10-12) - 7:30 AM – 10:40 AM / 11:20 AM – 2:30 PM**

Biology is the study of living things including the cell, body structure and function of simple and complex organisms as well as their relationship to each other and the environment. Included are topics such as classification, heredity and ecology. Lab included. The student will be assessed on the quality of the lab report using the LWSD rubric for Formal Lab Report.

Physical Science – First or Second Semester Credit SUM305**(Grades 9-12) - 7:30 AM – 10:40 AM**

This course will help prepare the student for dealing with an increasingly complex world. Concepts in the chemical, biological, earth and physical sciences form the basis for understanding environmental issues. Lab included. The student will be assessed on the quality of the lab report using the LWSD rubric for Formal Lab Report.

Washington State History SUM405**(Grades 10-12) - 11:20 AM – 2:30 PM**

This course explores the civics, economics, geography, and history of Washington State from pre-Columbian era to the present. Study will include Washington State's government, its Constitution, and local and tribal government. Through a close examination of Washington's history, government, geography and economy students will understand the role our state plays in our country.

High School graduation requirement**United States History SUM 421 – First Semester Credit****(Grades 10-12) - 7:30 AM – 10:40 AM**

This course explores the civics, economics, geography, and history of the United States from the pre-Columbian era through the 1890s. Students investigate our nation's government and history deeply and examine varied perspectives of issues or events. The focus includes the development of our country domestically as well as internationally. Students examine the evolution of U.S. foreign policy from the nation's infancy and critically investigate specific U.S. foreign policies, research the motives behind them, and examine their impact on our nation, our citizens, and the global community.

Social Studies skills are emphasized and practiced as students successfully complete a Classroom Based Assessment (CBA) in a presentation or paper evaluating a specific U.S. foreign policy based on an analysis of its causes and effects.

Junior Social Studies requirement**United States History SUM422 – Second Semester Credit****(Grades 10-12) - 11:20 AM – 2:30 PM**

This course explores civics, economics, geography, and history from the 1890s to the present. Students will investigate our nation's government and history deeply and examine varied perspectives of issues or events. The focus includes the development of our country domestically as well as internationally. Students examine the evolution of U.S. foreign policy and our role in the world today. Students critically investigate specific U.S. foreign policies, research the motives behind them, and examine their impact on our nation, our citizens, and the global community.

Social Studies skills are emphasized and practiced as students successfully complete a Classroom Based Assessment (CBA) in a presentation or paper evaluating a specific U.S. foreign policy based on an analysis of its causes and effects.

Junior Social Studies requirement**United States Government SUM430 – First or Second Semester Credit****(Grades 11-12) - 7:30 AM – 10:40 AM**

This course explores the economics, geography and history of the United States government. Preparing for their role as an active, engaged, knowledgeable citizen, students develop an understanding of the principles and process of the United States Government. Using the Constitution to focus the study, students understand the rights and responsibilities of involved citizens.

Social Studies skills are emphasized and practiced as students successfully complete a Classroom Based Assessment (CBA) in a presentation or paper wherein they make an informed decision on a public issue after researching and discussing different perspectives on this issue.

Senior Social Studies requirement

World History I SUM401 – First Semester Credit

(Grade 9-12) - 7:30 AM – 10:40 AM

This course explores the civics, economics, geography, and history of Asia and Latin America (areas of focus: India, Pakistan, China, Japan and Mexico). Beginning with the rise of civilization and continuing through the Early Modern Period (1500 – 1800 CE), students will explore the historical development of cultures, the comparative and interdependent political and economic systems, and social forces that shaped world history.

Social Studies skills will be emphasized and practiced as students successfully complete a Classroom Based Assessment (CBA) in a persuasive presentation or paper addressing human interaction with the environment.

Freshman Social Studies requirement

World History I SUM402 – Second Semester Credit

(Grades 9-12) 11:20 AM – 2:30 PM

This course explores the civics, economics, geography and history of Asia and Latin America (areas of focus: India, Pakistan, China, Japan and Mexico) in conjunction with the history and government of Washington State. Beginning with the Age of Imperialism (1850 CE) and continuing to present day, students will explore the historical development of cultures, the comparative and interdependent political and economic systems and social forces that make the world what it is today.

Social Studies skills will be emphasized and practiced as students successfully complete a Classroom Based Assessment (CBA) in a persuasive presentation or paper addressing human interaction with the environment.

Freshman Social Studies requirement

World History II SUM 411 – First Semester Credit

(Grades 10-12) 7:30 AM – 10:40 AM

This course explores the civics, economics, geography, and history of Europe, Africa and the Middle East. Beginning with the rise of civilization in Mesopotamia and continuing to the defeat of Napoleon (1815 CE) students explore the historical development of cultures, compare political and economic systems, and explore ideas, events, forces and trends of these regions in the world.

Social Studies skills are emphasized and practiced as students successfully complete a Classroom Based Assessment (CBA) in a persuasive presentation or paper analyzing a conflict and its causes from different social science perspectives.

Sophomore Social Studies requirement

World History II SUM412 – Second Semester Credit

(Grades 10-12) 11:20 AM – 2:30 PM

This course explores the civics, economics, geography, and history of Europe, Africa and the Middle East. Beginning with the Age of Nationalism (1840s CE) and continuing to present day students explore the historical development of cultures, compare political and economic development and systems and explore ideas, events, forces and trends which helped shape the world as it is today.

Social Studies skills will be emphasized and practiced as students successfully complete a Classroom Based Assessment (CBA) in a persuasive presentation or paper analyzing a conflict and its causes from different social science perspectives.

Sophomore Social Studies requirement

Spanish Enrichment Level 1 or Level 2 SUM501 OR SUM502

(Grades 9-12) - 7:30 AM – 10:40 PM

Prerequisite & Credits:

Students should have taken Spanish 1 or 2 previously. Students will receive .5 credits for successful completion of the course. If student receives a “C” or above on the final exam (given at the end of the course), the exam grade may replace previous 2nd semester grade with “C”. This class provides a review of material and can NOT be taken as a substitute for a year long Spanish class.

Description: This class provides a thorough review of previously covered material for students who are planning to advance to the next higher level of Spanish (2 or 3). Taking this course will increase the students’ level of confidence in the use of grammar and vocabulary to assure a successful start in next year’s class. Aside from vocabulary, this course will review key grammar topics like verb conjugation in present, preterite, and imperfect; the use of pronouns; and sentence structure. Students will practice Spanish by reading, writing, listening, and speaking.

English Language Learners (ELL) SUM010**(Grades 9-12) - 7:30 AM – 10:40 PM**

For English Language Learners. This course is designed to help students who are learning English as a new language to improve their ability to speak and write English. Also available for Junior High students.

Formal Lab Report Completion SUM340**(No Credit)****(Seniors only) - 11:20 AM – 2:30 PM**

During this course seniors will be guided through the completion of their Formal Lab Report. Students will work on demonstrating a solid understanding of the process of conducting a controlled experiment. The content of the class will be the practice of science through household chemistry or environmental science topics. The student will be assessed on the quality of the lab report using the LWSD rubric for Formal Lab Report. *Note:* Computers will be available for student use.

Writing/ Language Arts Improvement SUM701

(Grades 7-8) - 7:30 AM – 9:00 AM, 9:10 AM – 10:40 AM

Students will review previously learned skills and be introduced to new ones. Emphasis will be on the process of writing and the following basic communication skills: grammar, usage, conventions of writing from simple sentences to a five-paragraph essay, vocabulary enrichment, improvement of sentence structure, paragraphing and poetry writing. In addition, students are required to read and evaluate work of literature demonstrating an understanding of literary elements, quality and personal response.

Reading/Study Skills SUM706

(Grades 7-8) - 9:10 AM – 10:40 AM

This class includes instruction in techniques for improving reading comprehension, and strategies for developing vocabulary, analyzing and evaluating information acquired from various sources. Formal classroom instruction is utilized as well as individualized print materials to aid the student in attaining a higher level of achievement in reading speed, vocabulary, and comprehension.

This course is designed for instruction in the techniques for students who want to improve the study skill essential for success in course work. Time management, preparation for studying, textbook reading, listening effectively and critically, note taking, highlighting and test taking are emphasized. Students will appraise their present study skills, improve them and apply these skills in their present and future courses.

CMP 7 SUM727

(Grade 7) - 7:30 AM – 9:00 AM

This course covers the topics listed below. Students learn to recognize and generalize patterns and relationships and apply this knowledge to increasingly more difficult problems. Units will cover:

- An Introduction to Algebra: variables, tables, graphs and symbols as representations
- Similarity: similar figures with congruence as a special case
- Proportional Reasoning: rate, ratio, proportion and percent
- 3-D Measurement: surface area and volume
- Integers: operations with positive and negative numbers
- Linear Relationships: expressed in words, tables, graphs and equations
- Probability: expected value

CMP 8 SUM728

(Grade 8) – 9:10 AM – 10:40 AM

This course covers the topics listed below. Students continue to grow in their knowledge of mathematics using the strategies and concepts learned in the previous two years. Units will cover:

- Functions: an introduction to modeling with linear and other functions
- Pythagorean Theorem: right triangles, slope, area and irrational numbers
- Exponential Growth: graphing and writing exponential functions
- Quadratic Growth: graphing, writing and solving quadratic functions
- Symbolic Expressions: simplifying expressions and solving more complicated linear equations
- Transformational Geometry: symmetries and their relationship to algebraic properties
- Statistics: gathering data from samples to make predictions about populations.

English Language Learners (ELL) SUM710 Special Pricing (No credit)

(Grades 7-8) – 7:30 AM – 10:40 AM

This course is designed to help students who are learning English as a new language to improve their ability to speak and write English. This course will run combined with the Senior High ELL program. Tuition for this non-credit course is \$350.00.
