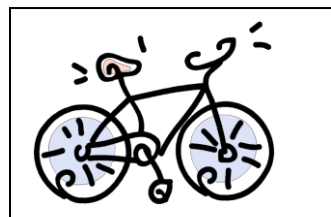
### Reminder – Bicycles, Scooters and Skateboards

As the weather begins to change, our kiddos may want to bring out their alternative modes of transportation. Here are some friendly reminders about our policies for students and visitors using bikes, scooters, and skateboards while at Frost:

- Skateboards
  - Per LWSD policy, skateboards are not allowed on any school district property. Please remind your students to leave these their skateboards at home.
  - If you have High School/Junior High students coming to Frost to meet their younger siblings, please remind them to leave their skateboards at home or off-campus as well.
- Bicycles and scooters
  - Students in 3<sup>rd</sup> grade or older interested in riding their bikes to school may do so after completing a Frost Bicycle Form, available in the office.
  - Students in K-2 are not allowed to ride bikes to school unsupervised. K-2 students wishing to ride their bikes to school will need to be accompanied by a parent or guardian and cannot ride alone until third grade.
  - Bicycles and scooters are allowed, but must be walked on campus.
- Bikes and scooters cannot be brought inside the building, and should be stored and locked to the outdoor bike racks.

I know that this can be hard for kids as they arrive and leave school grounds, but these rules are in place to keep students safe, both riders and walkers. To a child—and an adolescent—bikes, scooters and skateboards are meant to be ridden, not walked. Your assistance with this is appreciated, both with your Frost students and with any older siblings wishing to bring their boards, bikes, and scooters to the afternoon pickup. Thanks.

All Day applications need to include a check for the first month's tuition, \$330. There is no charge for the half day program. Office hours are school days from 8:30-4:00.
