Curricula

ICS has distinguished itself through an intensive sequential six-year study of academic rigor. Core classes, Art, Humanities, and International Studies, are interwoven throughout the curriculum yearly and developed to offer students integrated, thematic learning communities. Each part of the curricula builds upon mastery of previous teaching and each year students bring a strong foundation with them to their new studies. ICS promotes mastery through an intellectually dynamic learning environment where high achievement flourishes. The climate at ICS is one of high academic and behavior standards for all students. Round table discussions and project-based work cultivate a challenging and mindful education. *ICS maintains three goals: educating students by involving them in rigorous and integrated curricula; challenging students to become active participants in their education; empowering students to push the limits of their education by personalizing the internal structure of the school and the learning process.*

- Electives are available to students beginning in levels 4 and 5 (10th and 11th grades).
- Humanities and International Studies courses are required from level 1 (7th grade) — level 6 (12th grade).
- Students take a minimum of Spanish through level 4 (10th grade).
- Students take a minimum of two years of high school Math.
- Students are required to take one year of each Science: Biology, Physics, Chemistry, Earth Science
- Art is required through level 5 (11th grade).
- Beginning in level 4 (10th grade) all classes are Honors or AP.
- ICS operates on the quarter and semester system and all classes meet a minimum of four times per week.

Focus Week

Focus Week excursions are week-long, teacher led adventures in which students explore concepts outside those covered in the classroom. Whether traveling to distant shores such as Greece, Paris, or Colonial American battlefields or enjoying a local excursion such as Spanish cooking or Salish Sea exploration, students have the opportunity to delve deeper into and forge a stronger understanding of a topic that can transform their lives. Culminating Project

Senior spend more than forty hours creating a Culminating Project which he or she presents to a panel of staff and students in the spring. This is an opportunity for the student to find a focus of personal significance. It is through this project that the student demonstrates his or her finest planning, management, and presentation skills. This is where they show the true depth of their independent study. This is where one of the hallmarks of ICS students—strong leadership and grasp of knowledge—is demonstrated for the upcoming graduating classes.

Community

ICS is located in Kirkland, a small vibrant suburb of Seattle that offers small city intimacy alongside urban diversity and culture. ICS also draws students from Redmond, Sammamish, and Woodinville (known as “The Eastside”). Families grow in close proximity to local legends such as Microsoft, Starbucks, Boeing, etc. This area tends to draw residents who hold advanced degrees and participate in professional and artistic activities. Outdoor life is highly prized and our students participate in a variety of locally sponsored and privately funded sports.
