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AUDIT SUMMARY

Results in brief

In the areas we audited, District operations complied with applicable requirements and provided adequate safeguarding of public resources. The District also complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures in the areas we examined.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of Lake Washington School District No. 414 from September 1, 2014 through August 31, 2015.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the District's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Career and Technical Education (CTE)
- Credit card transactions
- General disbursements
- Travel expenditures
- Small and attractive assets

Financial

Federal grant programs

We evaluated internal controls and tested compliance with the federal program requirements, as applicable, for the District's major federal programs, which are listed in the Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs section of the separate financial statement and single audit report. That report includes a federal finding regarding material weakness and material noncompliance over suspension and debarment requirements. Special investigations

The District presented certain matters to us relating to cash receipting controls over ticket sales at school sporting events. We reviewed and communicated this matter to District management in a letter. We appreciate the District's response in reporting and resolution of this matter.

INFORMATION ABOUT THE DISTRICT

Lake Washington School District No. 414 serves more than 25,000 students from preschool through 12th grade in east King County. It encompasses 76 square miles and serves the cities of Kirkland and Redmond and parts of Sammamish, Bothell and Woodinville. The District operates nine high schools, 13 middle schools and 31 elementary schools. Included in these numbers are 13 choice schools (optional schooling alternatives) whose grade levels can vary.

An elected, five-member Board of Directors governs the District. The Board appoints management to oversee the District's daily operations as well as its approximately 2,800 employees. For fiscal year 2015, the District operated on a budget of approximately \$391.3 million.
