Acceptance from Northstar Community Jr. High Ad/Northstar Parent Fund to Northstar in the amount of \$18,563.83 to support classroom enrichment (\$5,000); to provide stipends for yearbook, music, field trips, activities, community building, and after school clubs (\$13,563.83). **TOTAL \$111,340.62**

Barbara Posthumus, Associate Superintendent, Business and Support Services, provided an update on enrollment. She presented this year's October 1 enrollment count report and October 1 enrollment for the past five years. Currently, there are 31,106 students. She highlighted the 2019-20 budgeted and actual enrollment. Running Start enrollment has increased from 352 to 805 over the past five years. The Lake Washington School District (LWSD) has gone from the 6th largest school district to the 2nd largest school district in five years. LWSD is one of the fastest growing school districts in the Puget Sound area; she presented enrollment information from neighboring and the six largest schools districts in the state. The district has had 11 straight years of enrollment increases; from 2008-2019 the district's enrollment grew by an average of 667 students per year. She reviewed demographic information.

Ms. Posthumus reported that the LWSD has contracted with Flo Analytics to enhance the district's long-range enrollment projections.

Robert Foster, Associate Director, Support Services, highlighted the effective use of resources at Transportation which is alignment with the District's Strategic Plan. Over 8,900 students are transported daily. Over 1.3 million miles are driven annually. He noted that the Washington State Patrols conducts two safety inspections each year; the district has received the highest rating for over 15 years. He provided updates on the types of buses and staffing/training requirements. He reported that new this fall is a new bus app, My Stop, which can be used to communicate to parents. In addition, the district has been working with Metro to increase accessibility to ORCA cards for students.

Siri Bliesner read a proclamation from the Governor Jay Inslee proclaiming the week of October 21-25 as School Bus Safety Week.

It has grown over the years to include over 120 school districts on the leading edge of innovation to looked at best practices and learn from each other. She provided highlights of this conference.

PRESENTATION BY HORIZON HOUSING ALLIANCE

November 4, 2019

SITUATION

Horizon Housing Alliance's (Horizon) is proposing a multi-family low-income apartment housing project for households exiting homelessness. This development is located at 16225 NE 87th St, Redmond, WA, the site of the current Together Center. The project is a 284-unit development and 80-units will be owned by Horizon. Of these 80-units, 60 units will be for families exiting homelessness. Horizon is partnering with the Together Center to redevelop the site to create permanent housing and an improved human services campus.

Patrick Tippy, Director of Housing Development, Horizon Housing Alliance, will present information as required by ARCH and other housing funding agencies.

RECOMMENDATION

The Board of Directors will receive information regarding development of a multi-family low-income apartment housing project for households exiting homelessness by the Horizon Housing Alliance.
