Origination of the JHS Mascot

 JHS opened in 1971 and selected the mascot "Rebel" in relation to their deviation from standard educational methodologies

Recent Events Related to JHS Mascot

- 2016-17 school year:
 - Concern was raised related to the JHS Mascot
- September 2017
 - Administrative Policy updated to reflect a school-based process for changing a school mascot
- June 2018
 - After school-based process, JHS students voted to maintain the current mascot.
- **•** June 2020
 - Additional concerns were raised regarding the JHS mascot and the School Board requested the Superintendent review the situation and provide an update at the July 13 Board Meeting

Admin Policy Update

Policy 6970:

Naming Schools and Mascots

- Removal of the school-based process for mascot change
- Clarified categories for naming schools
- Added language to require school names and mascots to be in alignment with policy and values
- Added language clarifying the Superintendent has the right to remove a school name or mascot

Specific Language Related to Policy 6970

- Should the Superintendent determine that a facility name or mascot does not meet the requirements of this policy; he/she may immediately remove the name or mascot and require the school to go through the selection process in order to adopt a new school name or mascot.
- Policy Requirements:
 - Mascots shall be
 - (1) culturally and racially sensitive and appropriate and
 - (2) comply with the district's Human Dignity (4010) and Nondiscrimination (5010) policies



• JHS Mascot was put into place with good intentions. The originators of the mascot did not use the term "Rebel" to honor/glorify slavery or the cause of the Confederacy.



- The term Rebel has direct linkages to the Confederacy
- Research on the term shows the most common understanding of the term (mascot label) Rebel is tied to concepts such as:
 - The South refencing the region that fought for slaveholding;
 - The Confederacy;
 - Stars and Bars or the Confederate Flag; and
 - The Lost Cause
- There are other Rebel mascot linkages but the primary connection with the term is to the Confederacy

Rebel Mascot at JHS

- Unfortunate historical references or visualizations
- Required to explain meaning/intent to those who ask
- A shocking experience to new students

Superintendent Decision

- I have determined that the Rebel Mascot does not meet the criteria set forth in Administrative Policy 6970.
- Therefore, I am immediately removing "Rebels" as the Juanita High School mascot.
- I will ask Dr. Matt Livingston, Director of Secondary Education, to work with Principal Kelly Clapp to start the process of change and identification of a new mascot.

Rationale for Decision

- Regardless of intent, the term Rebel, and its definitions, do not align with our stated values as a district
- A mascot should act as a mechanism that unites a student body
- No student, staff member, parent, community member, or alumnus should need to explain the intent of the mascot
- All students have the right to a safe and inclusive school environment

Next Chapter

JHS students, staff, parents, alumni, and community have the opportunity to write the next chapter of Juanita High School. Juanita has always been a place that welcomes unique individuals and helps them find a place. It is truly a special place.

I understand there are stakeholders that do not agree with this decision. I do not disparage them for their disagreement. The connection to school and those experiences help to create memories and meaningful human connections. A common identity, such as a mascot, can help define those memories and connections.

Regardless on your view of this decision, I hope everyone connected with Juanita can come together to take this next step forward. We all have a responsibility to our current and future students to make this next chapter great.
