


Jane Perkins


- English artist




Before You Begin

- 1. Write your **name** in pencil on the **back** of the paper.
- 2. Flip over your paper.
- 3. Roll up your sleeves!




The Human Face

What are the features we usually see on a human face? Point to your:



Gather what you'll need on your table for your portrait:


- Background paper
- Face-shaped paper
- Glue
- Some yarn or string for hair and eyebrows
- Cloth or printed paper for a shirt
- Objects to make your face.
 - \circ Eyes
 - \circ Nose
 - \circ Mouth
 - \circ Ears





We'll glue down the face first.

- Use a strong glue stick like Elmer's X-treme classroom glue stick to glue your face paper onto the background.
- If you use liquid glue, use a very small amount by putting small dots of glue under the face.
- Place the face into the center of the page, nearer to the top of the page than the bottom of the page.
- Press down firmly on the paper while you count to 5.
- Let go.



Now let's glue the eyes in place.

- Dip the back of your buttons or other objects in glue.
- Place them in the middle of the face.
- Press down firmly on each object while you count to 5.
- Let go.




Next glue the mouth and nose.

- Dip the back of your objects in glue.
- Place the nose in the middle just below the eyes.
- Place the mouth below the nose.
- Press down firmly on each object while you count to 5.
- If you use yarn, dip the yarn in glue. Be sure to press all of the yarn to the paper to glue it down everywhere.



Next glue the shirt.

- You may want to cut paper or cloth into the shape of a shirt.
- Carefully dip the back of your printed paper or cloth into the glue.
 - Try to keep the glue on only the back of the paper or cloth.
 - You do not need to cover the whole surface with glue for it to stick.
- Place the printed paper or cloth under the chin to make it look like a shirt that you are wearing.
- Press down firmly on the shirt while you count to 5.



Next glue the hair.

- Carefully dip your yarn, string or object into the glue.
- Be sure to press all of the yarn to the paper to glue it down everywhere.
- Take your time, and try to keep the glue tidy as you move the yarn, string or other object onto the paper.



Consider if there are any extra details you would like to add.

- Press the last objects into the glue.
- Press firmly onto the paper, especially if you are gluing details on top of other objects you have already glued to your paper.



Reflection

- What was your favorite part of this lesson?
- Which found object on your portrait is your favorite?
- What did it feel like to dip everything in the glue?
- Would anyone like to share their art, if time allows?
