Background

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- Starting with the Class of 2019, students are required to graduate with 24 credits
- In 2015, we formed a Task Force consisting of staff and parents to:
 - ▣ Study, analyze, and make recommendations to expand options for students to meet the 24 credits required for graduation
 - ▣ Analyze school schedule and start time implications
- In April 2017, the Task Force recommended adding time to the high school student day to create a seven-period schedule

Why are we implementing a 7-period high school day?

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- With the increase in state graduation requirements, over the past four years, elective opportunities and available space in student schedules for exploration, acceleration and remediation have decreased significantly for students
- By moving to a 7-period day, we return these important opportunities for our high school students

How is implementing a 7-period day connected to school start and dismissal time adjustments?

- To effectively implement a 7-period day, the high school day must become longer.
 - 20 minutes is being added to the student day at the high school level
 - The 20 minutes is being added to the end of the high school day vs. starting schools even earlier for high school students given research on adolescent sleep patterns and needs
- Therefore, High school start times will remain the same in 2018-19 and high schools will dismiss 20 minutes later
- The addition of time at the high school level results in needed adjustments to the start and dismissal times of elementary and middle schools due to our tiered transportation system

Preparing for the Changes

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- We acknowledge any change has an impact to families' current schedules
- We want to ensure families have ample time to plan for the change
- This change does not take effect until the start of next school year

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Process and Timeline for communicating school specific adjustments with families

Friday, March 9

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- Families will receive a school messenger message from their school's principal with school-specific start and end times for 2018-19
 - Links to webpages
 - Information on School Start Time Advisory

Will there be further adjustments to school start and dismissal times in the future?

- The School Start Time Advisory will continue their work in 2018-19 to study the impacts of potentially changing high school start times to later in future years
- The Advisory includes staff and parents from elementary, middle and high school levels
- They will make a recommendation for further adjustments to school start and dismissal times. Further changes in the 2019-2020 school year may or not occur, depending on their recommendation
- There will continue to be ample opportunity for families to provide input throughout the process
- Any changes to the high school start and end times result in adjustments to middle and elementary start and end times due to transportation
