Color is the hue, value and intensity of reflected light.





Materials

Watercolor or other sturdy paper



Tempera paint in a wide variety of colors & white



Artist's palette



Large, round paint brushes






Don't forget water cups for cleaning brushes!

Example of Today's Project




Before You Begin

- 1. Write your **name** in pencil on the **back** of the paper.
- 2. Flip your paper over.
- 3. Roll up your sleeves!





 Pick a set of analogous colors - any 3 colors that sit next to each other on the color wheel and have a common hue.

Note: Red is the common hue pointed out here. One color will be dominant and the other two add richness to the dominant color.



- Section off your paper by folding it into 4 quarters.
- Dip your brush in one of the 3 analogous colors you chose.
- Paint a heart shape using big, sweeping motions. Be sure that the heart goes through all 4 quarters.
- Brush strokes should be loose and wide.





- Paint the inside of the heart by choosing one of the other analogous colors you picked. This is an abstract painting - it doesn't need to be perfect!
- Paint the background around the outside of the heart with the final of the 3 colors.
- Remember to leave the original outline of the heart visible.





 Add a few strokes of white paint to create contrasting lines. The white paint will add depth and dimension to the heart.

Note: Paint around the outside and along the inside outline of the heart for emphasis.



- Add some "drybrush" strokes to the background to accent the heart.
- Use a mostly dry brush with a little paint in any of your 3 colors and apply in short, quick strokes going in the same direction. Don't let them blend in.
- Add other accents using paint or with black or white pastels. Just add a few!

- What 3 analogous colors would you use next time?
- What would it look like if a different set of colors had been used instead?
- What was your favorite part of our project today?
